## REPORT FROM VOLUNTEER RESOURCES

### **New Volunteers, New Roles**

Our volunteer program experienced a very busy and productive autumn. Since October, 29 new volunteers have joined the Association. We now have a total of 105 volunteers who are working regular weekly shifts. Our volunteer Team Leaders and others have been working very hard to strengthen our volunteer teams in all departments and areas. For the year of 2010 we had a total of 186 volunteers who contributed 14, 495 hours of service to the hospital. Great work volunteers!

We have new volunteer roles in Human Resources, Rheumatology, Wellness for Independent Seniors Initiative, Dermatology Laser, Psychiatry, Surgical Clinics, and After Cancer Treatment Transition Clinic (ACTT). We are excited about our new role in ACTT, a partnership with Princess Margaret Hospital which supports patients who are transitioning into a cancer-free lifestyle. Our clinic volunteers welcome patients, assist them to fill out forms, escort them to medical imaging, instruct them to change into gowns, weigh patients, answer non-medical questions, and make appointment reminder calls.

### **100 Years of Women's College Hospital**

Thank you to our volunteers who helped out at Brookfield Place with the Photography Exhibition celebrating 100 years of Women's College Hospital. Volunteers Eleonora, Flora, Ruby, Charlotte, Linda, Edie, and Erin staffed the exhibition over the course of 12 days. These volunteers offered visitors of the exhibit historical and current knowledge of the hospital, adding personal connection to an exceptional exhibit.

A special thanks to Women's College Hospital School of Nursing Alumnae who hosted the launch of the Brookfield exhibit. The utter success of this event was in no small part due to the alumnae hosts, many of whom wore their original uniforms and caps, adding historical character to the event. Thanks especially to our Executive member and nursing alumna Joan Hill for coordinating and making this possible.

### **Volunteer Learning Sessions**

In November Volunteer Resources facilitated a Patient Interaction Learning Session, the first event in a discussion series on topics relevant to our volunteers. The next session will be held on Thursday February 3<sup>rd</sup> and will be on topic of Equity and Inclusion.

## BROOKFIELD EXHIBIT AND 100TH ANNIVERSARY NIGHT

January 11, 2011 was a fantastic evening. The weather forecast for the evening was not good but a few hundred people attended. There were volunteers, over 50 nursing alumnae, 8 of us were docents for the evening wearing caps, capes and one gal wore her student uniform (I hate her). Many dignitaries were there: Dr. Lossing and his 3 daughters, Dr. Carolyn Bennett, former staff, and doctors. The highlight of the evening was Dan Hill talking about his time spent in Women's College when his mother suffered with manic depression and spent many weeks in the psychiatric wing. This went on for a few years and he grew up wondering if she would come back home again. There was a piano on the ward and he spent time in that room playing for the patients. It was there that he wrote his famous song 'Sometimes When We Touch' for his mom. He sang it and I was all goose bumpy-- it was beautiful, his voice is still great. Architects were there to talk about the new building, the photo display was awesome showing the history with all the pioneers, many photos from Seaton Street, Rusholme Road and the present site. The display was divided into six sections: Pioneers, Architecture, Babies, Breakthroughs, Nursing and Today. Delicious refreshments were served, and a wine and beer bar was available as well. It was a very upbeat evening with lots of photographers snapping pictures in what turned out to be a fantastic setting at Brookfield Place with all the special lighting.

On Saturday, January 15th, I spent two hours in the company of an exhibition of spectacular photographs in Brookfield Place in downtown Toronto. They were telling the 100 year history of Women's College Hospital and illustrating the current programs being carried on in the hospital.

There weren't many visitors but every one I talked to had a connection to WCH. The first man told me he is the nephew of one of the past Chairs of the WCH Board. Next came along a man whose wife had been an L and D nurse at WCH. She is now at Sunnybrook and misses Women's very much, Then there was a man who was born in WCH in 1931 and, along with his brother four years later, had his tonsils removed at WCH--he's never forgotten that day! Then came a young man and woman with a little boy. Mum, the little boy and his grandmother were in one of the photographs-- a lovely picture of three generations at Women's. So Dad took a picture of Mum and boy to show to his granny who was unable to come with them. Finally, there was a couple who looked at all the pictures and the woman turned to me and said, "I always said when I retired I would like to volunteer at Women's College Hospital." "We would welcome you with open arms," said I. It was a very rewarding two hours at Brookfield Place.

## **ORAL HISTORY PROJECT**

The Association of Volunteers is thrilled to announce the start of an internal oral history project. The purpose of this research project is to reflect back and hear from members on the significant accomplishments, landmarks, and obstacles of the 95 years of the Association of Volunteers. The tremendous collective support and contribution of our volunteers serves as an excellent jumping off point for the development of rich oral histories.

One of the factors that make the Association astounding is the level of commitment made by its membership. We would like to capture the stories of our long-standing Association members. You may be invited to be interviewed. This is your chance to tell your story about your time with the Association and Women's College Hospital. These recorded conversations will provide an archival record. We are also exploring creative ways to make these stories come alive in print or other media, especially in light of the upcoming 100th year anniversary of the Association in 2015.

As Michael Frisch wrote in *A Shared Authority: Essays on the Craft and Meaning of Oral and Public History*, '...the greatest need is for projects that take seriously the task of involving people in exploring what it means to remember, and what to do with memories to make them active and alive, as opposed to mere objects of collection and classification'.

The project will be spearheaded by volunteer, Ashley Friedman, with the assistance of Sarah Lord and Darleen Bogart. Ashley has a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from University of Guelph and a Master of Arts in Gender & Cultural Studies from Simmons College in Boston. She has a passion for women's health and feminist methods of qualitative research. She is very much looking forward to getting to meet and learn about the members of the Association of Volunteers.
