Thanks from WRAP

For the last twelve years, the Women Recovering From Abuse Program, also known as WRAP, has been treating women who have experienced maltreatment and abuse in childhood. It is a one-of-a-kind program in Ontario. WRAP is an intensive day treatment program that provides treatment four days a week from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Women that attend have often experienced multiple forms of trauma including physical, emotional and sexual abuse. Close to 50% of our clients are living on extremely limited incomes because of the psychological distress caused by the trauma. Often their only source of income is social assistance, which leaves them below the poverty line. Some are single mothers. For those women who are employed, they need to stop working temporarily while in WRAP because it is a day treatment program and very intensive.

The funding provided by the Association of Volunteers for TTC tokens since the beginning of WRAP has been essential for women, who could otherwise not afford the cost of transportation, to be able to attend the program. It has enabled women to move forward on their healing journey and lead healthier lives. This ongoing support is much appreciated by both the patients and the staff. Thank you for your steadfast support.

2011 Annual General Meeting

The meeting was held on May 5th at the Latvian Canadian Cultural Centre. The evening was most enjoyable and enabled staff and guests to meet and mingle with members. Guests included Mirella Quattrin, Chair, HAAO Toronto and Val Taylor of the York Heritage Quilters Guild. (The Guild gave us the lovely quilt we raffled in June). Dinner was excellent as usual and Elizabeth Scorey obtained beautiful table centres for us from Foglie's Flowers.

Dr Christine Lay, Director Centre for Headache at WCH was our dynamic speaker. Her talk on headaches was most interesting and informative especially regarding migraines.

Migraines often go undiagnosed and many people who complain of chronic severe headaches are in fact experiencing migraines. Migraines can be triggered by a number of factors, including hormone changes, stress, physical exertion, bright lights or sounds, some foods, as well as changes in temperature and environment. Though men also suffer from migraines, women are three times more susceptible. "Estrogen plays a huge role in triggering and perpetuating migraines," says Dr. Lay. That's probably one of the primary factors." There is no cure for migraine, but treatment may include pain relieving prescription drugs called Triptans, which attack pain and symptoms almost immediately. Taking magnesium and riboflavin supplements may positively affect pain. In addition to prescription medication, Dr. Lay also believes lifestyle changes may help such as routinely getting a proper night's sleep, drinking enough water, limiting caffeine, eating enough protein and avoiding food dyes and preservatives. Exercise, massage therapy, and possibly acupuncture may also help.

Self-diagnosis is common among headache sufferers, but in Dr. Lay's experience many people are getting it wrong, often labeling them as tension headaches. Many headache sufferers rely too heavily on over-the-counter pain medication, a reliance that can result in "rebound headaches", a phenomenon in which overuse of medication actually makes headaches worse. Getting a proper diagnosis from your doctor is important for many reasons, namely getting appropriate and effective treatment.
